Community Action Partnership was created as part of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, commonly referred to as the “War on Poverty,” for the purpose of tailoring services to meet the needs of individuals and families by helping achieve economic stability.

Community Action partners with public and private entities across the county and administers a wide array of programs designed to train and educate individuals while eliminating poverty. In 2017, Community Action provided services and education to over 54,103 residents.





# POVERTY IN RIVERSIDE COUNTY




### Riverside County Residents Below the Poverty Line

16.8% of the population, nearly **380,000 people**, have incomes below the federal poverty line.






## POVERTY PERCENTAGE BY CITY

## Established Savings for Success

Community Action established the Saving for Success program utilizing Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funds to help low-income participants save their money and acquire an asset. This program is a spin-off of the Assets for Independence (AFI) program that was eliminated by the federal government. What makes the Saving for Success program unique is participants have the ability to save toward various goals.



## Formed Tech for Success Partnership with Head Start

Community Action and Head Start formed a partnership through Community Action's Tech for Success program. Head Start children and families were provided an opportunity to earn a laptop to use toward their education or employment. Participants were responsible for completing workshops that provided essential skills to succeed in their lives. This partnership helped enrich the lives of the most disadvantaged and vulnerable children and families in the community.

# ACHIEVEMENTS



## Training and Learning Center

Community Action unveiled its state-of-the-art Training and Learning Center in 2017. It is equipped with the latest audio-visual technology and serves as a gateway for the community to access information and new opportunities. The Training and Learning Center serves as Community Action's new hub of knowledge, where a wide array of informational workshops and training opportunities are available for the public to access throughout the year. The Training and Learning Center is a testament of Community Action Partnership's ongoing commitment to serve the disadvantaged residents in the community by providing them with education, tools, and resources to achieve the vision of ending poverty in Riverside County.



## Created Toilet Replacement Program


This program provides free ultra-high efficiency toilets to homes located in the Santa Ana Watershed area. The purpose of this program is to reduce water use and environmental impact by installing high efficiency toilets in eligible homes.

# ACHIEVEMENTS



## Preserved Lingafelter Development Fund

Robert Lingafelter was an employee of the County of Riverside Community Action Partnership. Robert passed away in October of 1996 after a long battle with lung cancer. Robert dedicated his life to helping poor communities realize their hopes for the future and his family continued his legacy by donating monies to establish the Lingafelter fund. Although the funds were eventually exhausted, the Community Services team preserved the program through the use of CSBG funding. The Lingafelter fund provides small grants to grassroots organizations to help them with startup costs, such as, helping them obtain their incorporation and 501(C)(3) status.



## Implemented Case Data Management System

Community Action implemented a web based case data management system called CAPTAIN. The system has the ability to track program contacts, services, referrals, and can be customized to track customer assets and improvements. Additionally, there are comprehensive reporting capabilities. These features allow Community Action to collect and analyze data and make informed, data driven strategic decisions, thus improving customer outcomes and service.

# HIGHLIGHTS



The backpack initiative provides backpacks to low-income youth in disadvantaged communities throughout Riverside County. Last year, Community Action partnered with community based organizations and distributed 1,934 backpacks.

## Annual Bike Event

Community Action and Bicycles for Children, a nonprofit in the city of Corona, continued its partnership and provided bicycles to the most disadvantaged children in Riverside County.





# ENERGY SERVICES

## CALIFORNIA ALTERNATIVE RATES FOR ENERGY (CARE)

The CARE program provides a monthly discount of 20 percent or more on the electric or gas bill for individuals who meet the income eligibility guidelines, hold the utility account in his/her name and are qualified customers.

## ENERGY CRISIS INTERVENTION PROGRAM (ECIP)

The Energy Crisis Intervention Program assists income qualified applicants with one of their utility bills of either gas, electric, wood, propane or oil payment; as well as, heating or cooling equipment repair, or replacement on behalf of those households identified in a crisis situation. For utility assistance (gas, electric, wood, propane or oil), a payment is made when an applicant receives a 24-hour to 48-hours disconnection notice (or other utility service disconnection notice); or the applicant's utility services have been terminated; or the applicant requires assistance with establishing a new account. Emergency assistance for heating and cooling systems is offered to mitigate the immediate need that poses a life threatening situation during extreme weather conditions. After assessment, the unit problem will be addressed and repaired or replaced as deemed feasible.

## ENERGY EDUCATION

The purpose of the energy education is to teach the customer about the costs of energy, the benefits of energy conservation measures and practices and available resources, such as rebates, appliance safety and discount programs.

## SHARING HOUSEHOLDS ASSIST RIVERSIDE ENERGY (SHARE)

SHARE is funded by the city of Riverside and is specifically for Riverside Public Utilities customers. In order to leverage services received, SHARE customers may also apply for LIHEAP.

## TOILET REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

Santa Ana Watershed Project Authority (SAWPA) provides free ultra high-efficiency low-flow toilet installation to any households in Riverside County that live in disadvantaged areas and is open to all income levels. Occupants may receive an unlimited number of ultra high-efficiency 0.8 gallon per flush toilets if the existing toilets are 1.6 gallon per flush or higher.

## UTILITY ASSISTANCE

The Utility Assistance program is a one-time assistance program that helps low and moderate income individuals and families with utility payment assistance.

## WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE

The program provides free home energy conservation services to low-income Riverside County homeowners and renters. These services reduce energy use and lower utility bills, creating a safe and more efficient household. Energy-saving services include measures such as attic insulation, caulking, water heater blanket, heating/cooling system repair or replacement and other energy-efficient measures. A trained inspector assesses eligible dwellings for measures needed.


# COOL & WARM CENTERS

Community Action facilitates cool and warm centers throughout the region that provide a safe place for people, especially those most vulnerable, to escape extreme seasonal temperatures and save money on their utility bills. Cool Centers are active Jun. 1 through Oct. 15, and Warm Centers are active Dec. 1 through Mar. 31. In 2017, there were 56 Cool Centers and Warm Centers operating throughout Riverside County, serving 22,305 visitors.



# DISPUTE RESOLUTION


The Dispute Resolution Program provides mediation services and conflict resolution workshops and training to students and adults. Mediation is conflict resolution assisted by a neutral third party achieved through active listening, understanding, exploration of options and compromise. Mediation is a win-win alternative to small claims court. Through the mediation process, the individuals involved in a dispute work out their own solutions with the help of a mediator. Mediation saves money and time, and allows for a workable relationship, whereas, the court procedure is time-consuming, expensive and places the parties in adversarial positions. Additionally, Community Action offers Peer Mediation workshops to various school districts to help the youth resolve conflict and become peace ambassadors.



Total Volunteer Mediators in 2017 was 775 contributing 11,468 hours. Total in-kind for the Dispute Resolution Program in 2017 was \$466,060




Students receiving Peer Mediation training



# ASSET BUILDING

The Savings for Success Program is a matched savings incentive program for residents of Riverside County seeking economic stability. Participants must have income to be eligible for the program. Participants attend a series of mandatory and elective workshops to increase financial knowledge as well as to become better prepared to reach their goal. Participants open a savings account, contribute to reach the goal in savings to be matched by Community Action, and choose to pursue one of the three goals: purchase a first home, college or vocational school or start or expand a business.



There have been over 400 individuals who have graduated the program. Category breakdown is reflected above.

**Tech for Success**  
 The Tech for Success program provides laptops to families that participate in a series of workshops where they acquire skills and learn about community resources. The participants in these series complete workshops where they learn about financial literacy, raising money smart children, child support and conflict resolution. Each of the participants are presented with a laptop and certificate for completing course requirements that help them and their families thrive and prosper in their lives.

# VOLUNTEER INCOME TAX ASSISTANCE



The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program provides FREE tax preparation services to low to moderate income filers. During tax season, there are free sites across Riverside County. All sites are staffed by IRS Certified Volunteers.



# YOUTH PROGRAMS


## PROJECT L.E.A.D. (LINKING EDUCATION, ADVOCACY AND DEVELOPMENT)

Project L.E.A.D. is a program that recruits, trains and deploys mentors and tutors to assist students enrolled in after school programs at middle schools. Project L.E.A.D. provides mentoring and tutoring through character development activities such as recreation, crafts, arts and academic coursework.



## PRE-APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

The Pre-Apprenticeship Program is a workplace mentoring program that matches high school juniors and seniors with small businesses throughout the county. The youth are provided an opportunity to learn marketable job skills while still attending high school.



“On my first day I started Project L.E.A.D a student was crying quietly because she was frustrated with a math problem. She needed help but was not asking for help. I approached her and asked her if she needed help with her homework, I sat down with her and we both worked on a math problem. I told her that I myself had always had trouble with math, but I learned how to ask for help and that it’s ok to ask for help when needed. When she left my class she smiled at me. That was very rewarding.”

**Congratulations Prospero Perez for completing the Pre-Apprenticeship program!**




When Prospero joined Community Action's job mentoring program he was shy and unfamiliar with the computer software and hesitated to ask for help. With job training and mentoring, his confidence level quickly increased. Prospero began to communicate with his supervisor/mentors, co-workers and customers and was no longer afraid to ask questions.

By the end of his 520 hours of job training and mentoring, Prospero learned how to communicate with staff and customers, he learned how to answer phones in a professional manner, transfer calls and use an intercom. Additionally, he learned how to process payments, data entry, filing, customer service skills, Microsoft Word, and Microsoft Excel. He is now capable of creating various charts and graphs using Microsoft Office programs. Prospero plans to attend Riverside Community College. His career goal is to study Psychology and Music.

## RIVERSIDE COUNTY MENTOR COLLABORATIVE

The Riverside County Mentor Collaborative (RCMC) is a countywide partnership of more than 50 mentoring programs that assist, support and encourage safe, positive mentor-protégé connections. RCMC delivers mentor training workshops, promotes literacy, provides technical assistance, maintains a comprehensive directory of mentor programs in Riverside County and sponsors a telephone referral hotline.
