






POVERTY PERCENTAGE BY CITY

ACHIEVEMENTS





Project Roomkey was established in March 2020 as part of a response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The purpose of Project Roomkey was to provide non-congregate shelter options for people experiencing homelessness, protect human life, and minimize strain on the health care system capacity. CAP Riverside partnered with the Housing Authority and helped place hundreds of residents experiencing homelessness during the pandemic into shelter. Additionally, CAP Riverside assembled and delivered more than 150,000 meals to Project Roomkey participants as part of the pandemic response.



Response to COVID-19 Pandemic

CAP Riverside was committed to boost visibility during the COVID-19 pandemic through a CAP CARES billboard campaign. It increased community awareness on vital programs and services administered by the agency. Staff were encouraged to submit their billboard designs and winners were displayed across the county along major freeways to market both existing CSBG programs and new innovative programs such as utility assistance for water, trash, sewer, and internet bills utilizing CSBG CARES funding. This campaign increased visibility and access to programs that help eradicate poverty in Riverside County.



Pathways to Employment Program

The Pathways to Employment targeted adults who were impacted by COVID and lost income/employment during the pandemic by providing job training designed to lift participants out of poverty toward self-sufficiency. 517 participants participated in a job training and mentoring program to help them acquire sought-after job skills and experience. Pathways to Employment matched program participants with 53 local nonprofits and government entities. Participants received supportive services for their participation in the program such as assistance with transportation, clothes for work, childcare, etc.

Community Action receives grants from federal, state and local sources. Community Action is dedicated to growing its revenue and making every dollar count through use of volunteers and partnerships in the community.


COMMUNITY ACTION TACKLES POVERTY BY SERVING LOW-INCOME INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES



ENERGY SERVICES

CALIFORNIA ALTERNATIVE RATES FOR ENERGY (CARE)

The CARE program provides a monthly discount of 20 percent or more on the electric or gas bill for individuals who meet the income eligibility guidelines, hold the utility account in his/her name and are qualified customers.

ENERGY CRISIS INTERVENTION PROGRAM (ECIP)

The Energy Crisis Intervention Program assists income qualified applicants with one of their utility bills of either gas, electric, wood, propane or oil payment; as well as, heating or cooling equipment repair, or replacement on behalf of those households identified in a crisis situation. For utility assistance (gas, electric, wood, propane or oil), a payment is made when an applicant receives a 24-hour to 48-hours disconnection notice (or other utility service disconnection notice); or the applicant's utility services have been terminated; or the applicant requires assistance with establishing a new account. Emergency assistance for heating and cooling systems is offered to mitigate the immediate need that poses a life threatening situation during extreme weather conditions. After assessment, the unit problem will be addressed and repaired or replaced as deemed feasible.

ENERGY EDUCATION

The purpose of the energy education is to teach the customer about the costs of energy, the benefits of energy conservation measures and practices, and available resources, such as rebates, appliance safety and discount programs.



SHARING HOUSEHOLDS ASSIST RIVERSIDE'S ENERGY (SHARE)

SHARE is funded by the City of Riverside and is specifically for Riverside Public Utilities customers. SHARE customers may also apply for LIHEAP in order to leverage services received

UTILITY ASSISTANCE

The utility assistance program is a one-time assistance program that helps low and moderate-income individuals and families with utility payment assistance. Funding for the program is provided by the federal LIHEAP (Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program) and the City of Riverside SHARE (Sharing Households Assist Riverside's Energy).

WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE

The program provides free home energy conservation services to low-income Riverside County homeowners and renters. These services reduce energy use and lower utility bills, creating a safe and more efficient household. Energy-saving services include measures such as attic insulation, caulking, water heater blanket, heating/cooling system repair or replacement and other energy-efficient measures. A trained inspector assesses eligible dwellings for measures needed.

COOL & WARM CENTERS

COOL & Community Action facilitates cool and warm centers WARM throughout the region that provide a safe place for CENTER people, especially those most vulnerable, to escape Act extreme seasonal temperatures and save money on their utility bills. Cool Centers are active June 1 through Oct. 15, and Warm Centers are active Dec. 1 through March 31. In 2020, there were 31 Cool Centers and Warm Centers operating throughout Cool Center Attendance Riverside County, serving 39,840 visitors. Over 2,500 more than last year. MEDIATION PROGRAM

The Mediation Program provides mediation services and conflict resolution workshops/trainings to the community. Mediation is a process through which disputants work together with a Mediator, a neutral third party, to arrive at a mutually acceptable agreement with regard to the conflict. The purpose of mediation is to settle disputes, not to assign blame, fault nor legally represent either party. Mediation allows the parties to discuss their dispute and work together to facilitate an agreement. Mediation saves money, time, and allows a workable relationship, whereas, the court procedure is time consuming, expensive, and places the parties in adversarial positions. Additionally, Community Action offers no cost Peer Mediation trainings to all schools across Riverside County to help youth resolve conflict and become peace ambassadors.




A total of 53 Volunteer Mediators donated over 419 hours. Total in-kind for the Mediation Program was \$38,052.





ASSET BUILDING

The Savings for Success Program is a matched savings incentive program for residents of Riverside County seeking economic stability. Participants must have income to be eligible for the program. Participants attend a series of mandatory and elective workshops to increase financial knowledge as well as to become better prepared to reach their goal. Participants open a savings account, contribute to reach the goal in savings to be matched by Community Action, and choose to pursue one of the three goals: purchase a first home, college or vocational school or start or expand a business.



A total of 7 individuals graduated from the program.



Tech for Success

The Tech for Success program provides laptops to families that participate in a series of workshops where they acquire skills and learn about community resources. The participants in these series complete workshops such as financial literacy, raising money smart children, child support and conflict resolution. 227 households received a desktop and 88 participants from Banning Head Start, Val Verde School District, Mount San Jacinto Adult School and the Coahcella Valley Adult School received a laptop.



Lingafelter Development Fund

The Lingafelter Development Fund provides small grants to grassroots organizations to help them with start up costs. Diamonds in the Rough was the 2020 recipient that focused on transitional housing for homeless youth and Veterans.

VOLUNTEER INCOME TAX ASSISTANCE



The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program provides FREE tax preparation services to low to moderate income filers. During tax season, there are free sites across Riverside County. All sites are staffed by IRS Certified Volunteers.

YOUTH PROGRAMS

PROJECT L.E.A.D. (LINKING EDUCATION, ADVOCACY AND DEVELOPMENT)

Project L.E.A.D. is a program that recruits, trains and deploys young adults to mentor and tutor middle school students enrolled in after school programs. Project L.E.A.D. provides mentoring and tutoring through character development activities such as recreation, crafts, arts and academic coursework.



PRE-APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

The Pre-Apprenticeship Program is a workplace mentoring program that matches high school juniors and seniors with small businesses throughout the county. Youth are provided with opportunities to learn marketable job skills and time management skils while still attending high school.

Uyen-Nhi Dao started Project L.E.A.D. on August 30, 2018, and was assigned to Chemawa Middle School in Riverside. During her service, Uyen-Nhi participated in a number of trainings to help her gain knowledge and be a successful tutor/mentor. She blended very well and was able to make connections with the students. She gained their trust and demonstrated calmness and compassion. During the summer and fall of 2020, she helped Youth Programs expand with CARES funding and successfully completed the Pathways to Employment program.

Congratulations to Gonzalo Centeno for completing the Pre-Apprenticeship program!


